Para 1.17 and 1.19	The charity's main activities in furtherance of its objects are the editing and production of a journal, <i>Social History of Medicine</i> https://academic.oup.com/shm which includes research articles and book reviews. Also, the production of a series of scholarly books, <i>Social Histories of Medicine</i> https://manchesteruniversitypress.co.uk/series/social-histories-of-medicine/ . The Society maintains an international membership, holds a biennial conference and sponsors selected other relevant scholarly conferences. The Society also represents the subject in relevant policy-making bodies. Publication in our outlets and attendance at conferences is open to non-members. Membership for students and the unwaged is subsidized with the added benefit of reduced conference charges. Support is also offered through bursaries for students and early career members to attend relevant conferences. With its activities the Society aims to foster understanding for and raise the profile of the social history of medicine both in the UK and internationally. This includes lobbying activities relevant to members, and more broadly, history of medicine as a discipline, and responding to issues in relation to the strategies of relevant funding bodies such as the Arts and Humanities Research Council, the Economic and Social Research Council or the Wellcome Trust. Funds raised from sales of the journal and other relevant publications enable the trustees to fund its commitments and maintain a financial reserve.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.	Para 1.20	As detailed in each section below, in 2025 the charity operated through its usual activities to meet the objects of the charity. The Society continues with publication activities producing an academic peer-reviewed journal and book series. The Society also held activities and distributed networks funds due to funding received from the Wellcome Trust. Membership Membership is linked to publication of the Society's peer reviewed journal, <i>Social History of Medicine</i> and subscription to the journal constitutes membership of the Society. 2025 saw the publisher continue with a variety of membership options for online only or online & print, plus a 2-year subscription. The publisher, Oxford University Press (OUP), report that there were 196 members at the end of 2025, which is a decrease on

		the previous year (217 members in 2024), due to no conference being held in 2025. It is expected that membership will rise again in 2026 as the Society's biennial conference attracts new student members. In terms of broader membership data, 48.5% of members remain standard personal members (22 print, 73 online). This is broadly in line with – though at the lower end of – recent trends (61% in Jan 2024; 52%, 2023; 60%, 2022; 57% 2021, 55.5% 2020; 49.6% 2019; 57.2% 2018). In turn: Student members: 34.8% (n. 68), 20 print, 48 online, compared with 33% in 2024, 31% in 2023, 27% in October 2022, 30% in 2021, 30.3% in 2020; 38.7% in 2019, 30.7% in 2018. Seniors: 6.7% are seniors (3 print, 10 online), compared with 7% in 2024 and 9% in 2023 (n=9 print, 6 online). Developing countries: 4.1% (1 print, 7 online) compared to 7% in 2023, 3.7% (n=2 print, 4 online) in 2022 and 3% in 2021. Unwaged: 4.1% (8 online) compared to 3.6% in April 2024 and 2.4% in 2023. Overall, 46 opted for print membership (23.5%). This is slightly higher than 2024 (18%), but trends seem to indicate that print membership is about 20% of members (23% in April 2023; 27% in 2023). It is worth noting that 14% (n= 29) of our members have taken up the 2-year membership option, which seems broadly consistent with 2024 trends (10% in November 2024; 14% in April 2024) but is a large increase on 2023 (4.3%) and an increase on 2022. Finally, with regards to geographical location, 61.9% our members continue to come from the UK, which is broadly consistent with ongoing trends (60% in April 2024; 70% in Jan 2024, 66% in 2023, 60% in October 2022, 58% in 2021, 58.7% in 2020; 59.5% in 2019; 53.9% in 2018). Most of the remaining members are from North America [Canada (n=5), the United States (n=18)] at 11%, compared to 11% in November 2024; 10% in April 2024; 13% in Jan 2024, 15% in 2023, 14% in October 2022. A similar proportion of members register from Europe (12.75%), with the
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		remaining members spread across institutions in Asia and Oceania. Australia and New Zealand (n=12) and India (n=5) predominate here. The Society has two members who do not subscribe via OUP, and their payments are recorded in the accounts. The Executive Committee have been in discussions with OUP about moving the journal to an online only format from 2027 and taking membership back in-house. <i>Publications</i> The Society's journal <i>Social History of Medicine</i> continued in 2025 to receive an increased number of submissions (original and revised) with a total of 268 (205 in 2024; 175 in 2023). The Society published 4 issues of the journal for 2025 (Volume 38). For the year a total of 37 original articles were published. There were 59 book reviews published in the 4 issues of volume 38 (56 in volume 36 in 2024). The book series with Manchester University Press, <i>Social Histories of Medicine</i> continues to prosper with a total of 44 books and 3 in press. Three awards of £2,000.00 were made for the 2024/5 book development award (deadline of 15 March 2025). This was due to only one award made in 2023. Since the last return books published were: R. Elder and T. Schlich (eds.), <i>Technology, health and the patient consumer in the twentieth century</i> (2025); S. Heydon, <i>Implementing a global health programme: Smallpox and Nepal</i> (2025); R. Moul, <i>Brutal treatments: Medicine and colonial violence at the end of empire</i> (2025); S. Crook, <i>Unhappy mothers: Women, motherhood and social change in postwar Britain</i> (2025); V. Bates, <i>Feeling blue: Colour and the modern hospital</i> (2025). During 2025, The Gazette format was reviewed by the Executive Committee, and a new editor joined the board in October 2025. The first new-style newsletter format will be delivered monthly from January 2026.
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		<i>Conferences/Workshops</i> The Society invites applications for conference funding three times a year. A total of £7,493.87 in new grants was awarded in 2025 to support conferences in the history of medicine (totals claimed for conference funding for 2025 = £8,730.00 (made up of £3,130.00 from 2025 awards and £5,600.00 from conference awards made in 2024). New conference awards included: Plants and People: the cultivation and propagation of botanical knowledge among non-professional communities, c.1600-1800 (University of Cambridge, July 2025). Durham University Medieval and Early Modern Student Association's 19th Annual Conference: 'Illuminating Nature: Explorations of Science, Religion, and Magic' (Durham University, July 2025). Policing and Public Health, c.1800-2000 (London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, September 2025). Representing, Reshaping Reenacting: Performance studies and practices as methods for the history, philosophy, and social studies of science and medicine (Charité Museum of Medical History, Berlin, November 2025). Thorny matters: Histories of health phenomena in between ethics, law and life in South-West Asia and North Africa (SWANA), (Institute of Arab and Islamic Studies, University of Exeter, April 2026) The Ethics of Medical Photography: ECR training workshop (de Montford University, May 2026). Who Cares? Psychiatry in the English-speaking world #2: Theories & Policies (Université Paris Nanterre (France), March 2026). <i>Student and early career travel bursaries</i> In 2025 a total of £8,221.59 was awarded in travel bursaries for students and early career academics to attend and present papers at
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		international and UK based conferences. All awards were claimed in 2025. Prize winners The Society awards an annual prize, the Roy Porter Essay Prize worth £500, for the best original unpublished essay in the social history of medicine. For the 2024/5 competition, the Society also awarded two further £100 prizes for Commended essays. The 2024/5 Roy Porter Prize was awarded to: Charlotte Stobart (University of Manchester) “‘She Types with Her Toes’: Examining Experiences and Representations of Polio-Disability through The British Polio Fellowship Newsletter, The Bulletin, 1963-1973’. Commended essays: Elena Danieli (Università di Bologna and Université Paris Cité) ‘Portraits of an Art: Truth, Representations, and Scientific Trajectories in French and British Obstetric Illustrations from the Second Half of the 18th Century’ Zhilin Chu (University of Cambridge) ‘Vaccination of Dogs: Rabies Control and Colonial Rivalries in the Shanghai Concessions, 1920s–1940s’. The competition received 17 submissions, a higher number than the previous year. The winner of the 2025/6 Roy Porter Essay Prize is scheduled to be announced in summer 2026. Web and Social Media The Society's website hosted on WordPress for 2025 attracted 26.8K overall views, less than 2024 with 31K views but higher than 2023 with 23.4K views. A total of 11.8K visitors, slightly down compared to 2024 with 12.4K visits but higher than 2023 with 10.1K visits. Most popular pages were the home page, prizes, AGM and SSHM lecture and history of medicine call for conference papers. The website continues to have international reach with most site visitors from the UK, followed by the United States, India, Canada, Germany, Netherlands, Australia,
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		Italy, Ireland and China. Work in 2025 focussed on updating and curating a new presentation of the Society's website for launch in 2026. For social media the Society monitors accounts on Bluesky (12.4K followers) and from September 2025, a company page on LinkedIn (548 followers). The Society uses its platforms for global community networking by sharing events, new publications and conference call for papers. Wellcome Funded Events and Networks Grants As a result of the successful grant applications in 2021 (see additional information). The Society held the third and final event: A Mid-Career Writing Retreat in April 2025. A total of 5 Network Grants were awarded to the networks listed below. All networks had held their events by November 2025. Achievements against objectives set	Para 1.41	In October 2021 the society applied for two grants from the Wellcome Trust. One for £25,000 to fund Society events (over 48 months). The application was successful and grant funds are administered via the University of Strathclyde. Wellcome funds will enable bringing scholars together for physical meetings is essential to create the safe space needed for such sensitive discussions as anti-racism, facilitated by a clinical professional and academics experienced in this area, and regarding concerns about careers. All three planned events have now taken place, an anti-racism
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		workshop, a precarity workshop and mid-career writing retreat. Another grant application for £25,000 was to support the objective of directing funding to networking and networked events. These serial activities promise the space to be both innovative and sustained; a space that has often been limited in the field of the history of medicine and health. What these sustained conversations will do is provide room for creativity and thinking, offering transformative scholarship and assuredly facilitating links and work that would otherwise prove impossible, especially due to our current availability of £1500 per conference funding application, limited so as to support as many activities as possible. Financial Review

Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period	Para 1.21	The charity's assets during 2025 amounted to £100,231 in cash reserves at the end of the period. Applications in 2025 for conference travel bursaries were at a lower level than 2024 due to being a non-conference year (Society conferences are biennial with the next conference due to take place in 2026). The trustees will continue to utilise the reserves accumulated during the pandemic by making more bursary and conference funding available, particularly in biennial conference years.

policy for holding reserves stating why they are held		holding reserves to cover one year's cover cash flow requirements and for any potential gaps in income. In addition, extra reserves of £60,000.00 are being held should the running of the journal be affected as a consequence of Plan S and publishers' commitment to transitioning their journals to open access through the Transformative Journal model. The reserves are held in a savings account. The trustees continue to discuss ways to reduce excess reserves. With the withdrawal of conference support from Wellcome Trust, the Society now supports its own biennial conference at a host institution estimated in the region of £15,000. For 2026 there are plans to substantially support members' attendance through a targeted bursary scheme for members who are students, early career, unwaged or precariously employed on short-term contracts.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

TO THE TRUSTEES AND MEMBERS OF THE SOCIETY FOR THE SOCIAL HISTORY OF MEDICINE

I report on the accounts for the charity for the year ended 31st December 2024 which are set out on pages 15 to 16 and have been prepared using the receipts and payments method.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.
